5. Report of the Town Manager

a. TM Report November 15, 2023

- Northern New England Planning Conference: The Northern New England Planning Conference was held last week in New Castle. One session was a walking tour of Newmarket depicting all of the town's successes in redeveloping the downtown. About 25 people joined the Town Manager, Town Engineer and Community Development Director on the tour.
- Parking Study: The Town undertook a parking study in 2009 as part of the Main Street project. The Town Manager met with the Director of the Strafford Regional Planning Commission. They have an individual on staff with expertise in parking design. That individual will review the parking study and advise on how to update it.
- Additional Highway State Aid: The town will receive a one-time property tax relief through additional state highway grant money. As soon as we receive notice of the amount, we will make recommendations on the best way to use it.
- <u>Recreation sign:</u> The sign that will be placed on land owned by the Newmarket Housing Authority is being worked on and will be installed as soon as all the logistics are taken care of.
- <u>Clay v Town of Newmarket:</u> The Right to Know Ombudsman dismissed the case with prejudice, which means the Ombudsman Office is done with the case and the settlement agreement stands.
- b. Department Reports October 2023 Councilor LaMattina congratulated Environmental Services Director Greig for receiving the Water Environment Federation Hatfield Award.

Councilor Conley questioned the rise in overtime at the Police Department. Town Manager Fournier will double check, but explained that it is usually due to covering shifts when there are staff vacancies.

Councilor Conley commented that the Recreation Department is looking for volunteers and if anyone from the public is interested they should reach out to Director Aimee Gigandet. She congratulated Sam Heffron for receiving the New England Water Environment Association's Wastewater Operator of the Year Award for New Hampshire and Sean Greig for receiving the Water Environment Federation Hatfield Award.

Town Engineer Lyndsay commented on drainage pipe replacement at the intersection of Packers Falls Road and South Main Street. The NH Department of Transportation (NH DOT) supplied the new pipe and the Public Works Department supplied the labor.

6. Committee Reports

Councilor Ward reported on the November 9th Conservation Commission meeting:

Community Development Director Bart McDonough and Autumn Scott from the Strafford Regional Planning Commission (SRPC) gave a presentation on the Master Plan. The Commission discussed the desire to meet regularly with the SRPC. They will have a representative attend the Conservation Commission meetings each month. The Commission is currently working on an "open space" survey pertaining to existing conservation lands. They discussed holding a trivia night at the River Works Restaurant and Boulder Hill trail repairs. The Nature Conservancy will host Astromony Night on January 8, 2024.

Councilor Blackstone reported on the November 14th Planning Board meeting:

The applicants of the 55+ housing proposal returned to the Board with a new building design and reduced the units from 32 units down to 30 units. The application is continued to the December Planning Board meeting.

Councilor Glazebrook reported on the November 7th Arts, Culture & Tourism Commission meeting:

The Arts, Culture & Tourism had a kickoff meeting with the Willey Park advisory board. The advisory board will meet separately from the Arts, Culture & Tourism Commission regarding the Willey Park project.

\$500,000 grant the town will receive from the state is left over American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds. He further explained that the last of the ARPA funds must be used by

January 2026.

Discussion: Environmental Services Director Greig explained the

septage receiving station will be moved from Creighton Street to the Waste Water Treatment Plant. The funds for the purchase of the equipment will come from the septage receiving capital reserve fund. Director Greig said they are currently working on the engineering portion of the project and hoping to put it out to bid in May and begin construction

in the fall.

Discussion: Town Manager Fournier explained that he was approached

by members of the Newmarket Community Development Corporation (NCDC) offering the town the use of the

parking lot at the intersection of Dame Road and Route 108 that they own to sell parking passes to residents for a fee. The agreement allows for a 6-month window where either party may terminate the agreement. The parking lot use will not preclude the lot being used for something else. Using the lot for parking will be a bandaid, not a permanent

solution.

d. Resolution #2023/2024-22 WA Sewer Collection System bond

Discussion: Environmental Services Director Greig explained that it will

cost 1.75 million to do the necessary repairs to the sewer lines. The pipes are old and cracked. The town will receive

\$100,000 grant to offset the 1.75 million.

e. Resolution #2023/2024-23 WA Moonlight Brook Stormwater Work

Discussion: Town Engineer Butler explained that the resolution is to

request authorization to accept a state revolving fund loan to investigate the town's infrastructure that discharges into Moonlight Brook. This will involve catch basin investigation and identification of sources in hopes of addressing the bacteria load within Moonlight Brook and to make sure the town's infrastructure isn't contributing to it. She further explained that the \$73,500 we are requesting from NH DES

will have 100% principal forgiveness.

Town Manager Fournier said that there will be a Town Council Work Session on December 6th at 6:00 PM to discuss the Facilities Study. He informed the Council that the Primary Election will be held on January 23, 2024 and that a majority of the Council has to be present at all times during the election.
