A 6 check was issued as a deposit for one half of the price of the new Piscassic River 7 8 Loiselle sign. The current balance in the General Fund is \$1,823.43. 9 **Committee/Board Reports** 10 [time on DCAT 8:35] Planning Board: Jeff Goldknopf had nothing new to report from the Planning Board. 11 **Town Planner:** Ellen reported about the first meeting of 'Connect to Protect'. The team 12 representing Newmarket includes Ellen Snyder, Tom Jones, and Bart. The goal of 13 'Connect to Protect' is to present workshops and opportunities tailored for assistance to 14 municipal boards and conservation organizations. This first meeting was a 15 brainstorming session to help work toward our interests in connectivity while preserving 16 17 lands in the Town and, in particular, our desire to connect with other groups to learn and benefit from their efforts. It appears that they could help us upgrade our trail maps. She 18 also mentioned that the ConCom would like to connect with our partners like SELT. We 19 20 have reached out to SELT to continue conversations about what they are planning for this area and ways we might be more collaborative. Tom mentioned that the 21 coordinators were very interested in the wetland corridors and ways to improve 22 saltmarsh resiliency and mitigation. The Chair will keep everyone posted as the 23 discussions progress. New Hampshire Coastal Watershed Conservation Plan - Connect 24 to Protect (connect-protect.org) 25 26 Riverfront Advisory/ Schanda Park: Sam Kenney reported this evening that the next meeting will be held on February 13, at 4 PM and will be a joint meeting of the RFAC 27 and Conservation Commission members with the Strafford Regional Planning 28 Commission to discuss coastal resiliency and grant opportunities. It will be taped for 29 DCAT. **Ellen** reported on the recent oil spill of 200 gallons from a private home off Bay 30 Road that leaked into the Lamprey below the dam. See Addendum #1 at the end of the 31 minutes for details. The Recreation Department has sent an application to secure the 32 33 dates for the Annual Arts-in-the Park concerts at Schanda Park for summer 2023. The concerts will begin on Tuesday, June 27. **Energy and Environment Advisory Committee:** Julianna Tyson is absent this evening.

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7. Conservation Easement Monitoring [time on DCAT 16:46]

**Melissa** and **Jeff** completed the monitoring of the New Roots Farm and **Melissa** is finishing the report. **Jeff** was concerned about a few of the markers that were gone and should be replaced. The ConCom will review the report when available. He will touch base with Jeff Cantera, the owner, and discuss any possible changes with him. The Chair understands that he has changed the name of the farm.

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Sliding Rock Recreation and Conservation Area – LRAC Grant: Ellen reported on one of the components of the LRAC grant. She visited the ¼ mile trail with Lew Shelley who is a trails consultant. He answered her basic questions and he provided a best estimate for a completed accessibility trail which could cost approximately \$40,000.

Sam will do research about the cost of any extra permitting costs. The Chair thinks that we need to speak with Rick Malasky about the current cul-du-sac parking. Several parking spots would need to be dedicated to accessible handicapped parking. It was decided to go out there with Rick during a peak summer time and Colin Lawson was enthusiastic about going on the site walk as well. Ellen mentioned the new accessible trail completed recently at Manchester Cedar Swamp Preserve by the Nature

23 Conservancy – it is truly beautiful. Manchester Cedar Swamp Preserve | The Nature

24 <u>Conservancy in NH</u>. The members will continue to discuss the possibility of an accessible trail. **Ellen** is reaching out to the sign maker we often use to get a gu

accessible trail. **Ellen** is reaching out to the sign maker we often use to get a quote on the new kiosk signage which is another part of the grant from LRAC.

Wiggin Farm - 2023: kiosk bridge, sign posts, invasives: Sam walked out with Vic Bilodeau to assess the bridge. They pushed on the rails and posts, but more inspection will be necessary after spring melt. They felt that the bridge needed to be extended about 15' on the parking lot side and about 40' on the other end. They looked at any loose boards which might need to be replaced. Both Melissa and Jeff mentioned using some anti-slip materials on the boards and **Sam** and Vic agreed. Lumber is certainly not cheap, so they recommend focusing on the bridge extension and just replacing boards on the bridge as necessary. They looked at the kiosk. The posts are 'done' after they snapped in the storm. The roof is still okay and the plywood might be salvageable. **Ellen** asked **Sam** to check on any permitting costs for doing the extensions. **Ellen** will contact Kevin Martin about a new kiosk. Another issue at Wiggin Farm is the entrance sign. The posts securing the sign have heaved and need to be re-set. The sign is dirty and needs to be cleaned and/or repainted. Melissa checked on the cost for that work and it would be \$875.00. Sam would like to try a little vinegar and a tooth brush. The signage on the kiosk is outdated and we need new panels. Ellen would like to schedule an invasive removal work day around Earth Day (April 22). A date will be chosen at a later meeting.

<u>Dearborn – Driveway ROW Easement:</u> Ellen just received several samples of ROW easement language from Fish & Game. She will be putting together a draft for the deed and will be running that by Bart and F&G for their comments. She plans to bring this

- back to the ConCom, the abutters, and then ask the Town Attorney to review the deed changes.
- 3 <u>SELT's Piscassic Greenway Management Plan:</u> SELT is just beginning a review of
- 4 the existing management plan for the Greenway and consider updates. The plan will
- 5 include forestry, wildlife, and recreation. The committee has representatives from
- 6 Newfields, Fish & Game, and Newmarket. Drew Kiefaber (long-time member and Chair
- of the ConCom) will be the representative from Newmarket. Due to a staff vacancy at
- 8 SELT, **Ellen** has been hired to facilitate the meetings. Anyone from Newmarket with
- 9 comments may send those to Drew at (drew.kiefaber@gmail.com) or we could invite
- Drew to the attend a ConCom meeting. The meetings will begin this month and continue
- 11 for approximately six months.
- 12 <u>UNH Extension Summer Stewardship Intern Applications:</u> When Ellen worked for
- Durham, she applied for UNH Extension Summer Interns. She contacted Ann Tappan
- 14 from the Lee Conservation Commission to collaborate on a request. She attached a
- copy of the application and description of projects to the member's packet. She was
- thinking of asking for an Intern for one week (hours to be determined). It is necessary
- for the interns to be accompanied at all times and the interns are funded by UNH.

## TOWN OF NEWMARKET, NH PECIAL NNOUNCEMENT

## Oil Spill in Lamprey River

Approximately 200 gallons of home heating fuel leaked into the river in the area of Bay Road.

At approximately 11AM on February 7, a call came into Newmarket dispatch of oil in the Lamprey River near Heron Point. It was later determined that the source of the oil was a private heating oil tank at a residence on Bay Rd. This oil entered the Town's drain system in the area of the Bay Road parking lot and went into the river. It is estimated to be approximately 200 gallons of No. 2 oil in the river.

The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) was immediately notified, and their Emergency Response Team is now working with Newmarket Fire and Rescue to contain it and determine next steps. NHDES is now the agency in charge of the incident.

We will provide additional information when available.
